Part 1: The Vision

Gill Rob Wilson

- WWI pilot and NJ Director of Aeronautics
- 1936 flies to Germany on the Hindenburg
- Tours Germany and is convinced it is gearing up for war
- Wilson and others envision a US civilian aviation defense force
- November 1941 Civil Air Defense Services (CADS) is established at the request of Fiorello LaGuardia, director of the federal Office of Civilian Defense and mayor of NYC.
- December 1, 1941 President Roosevelt signs Executive Order establishing the all volunteer Civil Air Patrol (CAP) under the Office of Civil Defense
- December 8, 1941 CAP announced to the public; recruiting begins


German U-boats

- January 13, 1942 German Uboats authorized to attack shipping along the east coast of the United States and in the Gulf of Mexico
- January to August 1942 U-boats sink 22 tankers and 233 merchant ships
- **5,000 killed**
- U-boats transport saboteurs to New Jersey, Long Island, North Carolina, Florida





- February 28, 1942 First patrol base established at Bader Field, Atlantic City, NJ
- Between March 5, 1942 and August 31, 1943:
 - 86,865 missions flown
 - 24,000,000 miles flown
 - 244,600 flight hours
 - 173 U-boats sighted and reported
 - 57 depth charge or bomb attacks
 - 2 U-boats may have been sunk or damaged
 - 91 ships in distress reported
 - 17 floating mines reported
 - 363 survivors of U-boat attacks reported
- 90 CAP aircraft were lost
- 26 CAP pilots died













This aircraft at Coastal Patrol Base No. 1 in Atlantic City, New Jersey, belonging to Maj. Wynant Farr, was equipped as follows: A 250-pound bomb under the belly, eight flares or smoke bombs, a Grimes signal light, a box of lenses for the light, six sea markers, two life rafts and two Mae West life preservers. The chevrons on the aircraft each represented 100 hours of patrol flight time.






LEGACY PROFILE | Col. Charles E. Compton (1916-2020)

The Last Subchaser

Col. Charles E. Compton lived a full life, and he spent much of it with Civil Air Patrol. As a young man, the organization gave him the opportunity to serve his country during World War II. He later commanded CAP units alongside his sons. As a nonagenarian — a man in his 90s — Compton's congressional testimony about his wartime experiences helped earn Civil Air Patrol the Congressional Gold Medal.

Compton passed in June at nearly 104, knowing his legacy would live on through both a loving family and the Illinois Wing composite squadron named in his honor.

Born and raised in Chicago's South Side, Compton attended the University of Chicago Lab Schools and Lake Forest Academy. At Dartmouth College in New Hampshire, he started a small flying club and earned his pilot's certificate in 1937 at age 21. Village of Glenbrook Resident Receives Congressional Gold Medal

Barbara Hinebaugh, a pilot with the Civil Air Patrol during WWII, wasn't expecting the recognition.

Barbara Hinebaugh recently received a special honor she wasn't expecting.

The 99-year-old former volunteer pilot with the Civil Air Patrol during World War II received the Congressional Gold Medal for her service at a ceremony held Saturday at New Covenant United Methodist Church. Col. Luis Garcia, commander of the Florida Wing of the Civil Air Patrol, presented the award and thanked Barbara for her service.

But Hinebaugh never knew she was eligible for the award until she received an unexpected phone call.

"Out of the clear blue sky in June. I had a call from Lt. Col. Robert Frost of the Civil Air Patrol wanting me to verify I had flown for CAP during

World War II," said Hinebaugh, of the Village of Glenbrook, Frost, a former group commander of the Pennsylvania Wing of the CAP, called to check Hinebaugh's years of

found his mother's CAP identification card for the verification. It wasn't until 2014 that members of the Civil Air Patrol received the Congressional Gold Medal for their efforts during World War II, said Maj Deborah Kolos, commander of Group II with the Florida Wing of the CAP.

Hinebaugh, who flew a Luscombe single-engine plane doing searches along the Great Lakes on missions from 1942 to 1943, joined the CAP soon after the patrol was founded in 1941. The CAP, which had about 200,000 civilian volunteers, was part of the U.S. Office of Civilian Defense.

"It was a rare thing for a woman to be piloting a piane then? Kolossaid. "(Hinebaugh) flew a minimum of three times a week, and that was fabulous." The award came as a complete surprise to Hinebaugh more than 75 years after her service, and she thought the

coremony was worth the wait. About 200 friends, family and church members, including about 30 members of the Civil Air Patrol from all over the country, attended the ceremony and the reception that followed, "(CAP members) were so excited that we could henor hen' Kolossaid. But Hinebaugh couldn't believe so many people attended.

"I thought it was wonderful," she said.

Vance Hinebaugh, his sister, Kathryn Bransford, and many of Barbara's grandchildren and great-grandchildren were there. Barbara learned to fly in her 2005 and flow milytch two wears

20s and flew only the two years or so during World War II. "I enjoyed the flying and all

the people," she said After the war, she married her husband, Judd, and started a family.

At the ceremony Saturday, the Rev. Harold Hendren, senior pastor at New Covenant UMC, recognized Hinebaugh for

her efforts and manked her for her service to the church community.

Hendren was pleased that Hinehaugh selected her church as the venue for the celebration. "(Hinebaugh) has been

extremely faithful and is beloved among our congregation," he said. "We were honored to be part of the day." As Hinebaugh, she was

humbled by the love and support. "I was completely over-

whelmed with all the effort and the graciousness of everyone," she said.

Willa Brown was born in Glasgow, Kentucky, in 1906 to a biracial family with a Native American mother and an African American father. She majored in commerce and business at Indiana State University.

Lt. Brown became the first African American officer in the Civil Air Patrol.



A fitting tribute to the CAP of World War II was a statement made by a former German U-boat commander. Sometime after the war, an American military officer interviewed the ex-U-boat commander and asked him why U-boat attacks stopped along the east coast of the United States.

His answer was "because of those damned little red and yellow planes."




- October 1, 1942 CAP cadet program established for boys and girls 15 to 18 years old
- April 29, 1943 CAP transferred to the Department of War
- July 1, 1946 President Truman signs Public Law 79-146 incorporating the CAP
- September 18, 1947 Army Air Corp becomes the U.S. Air Force
- May 26, 1948 President Truman signs Public Law 80-557 establishing CAP as a civilian unit of the U.S. Air Force
- May 30, 2014 President Obama signs legislation awarding the Congressional Gold Medal to the approximately 200,000 WWII CAP members
- April 28, 2015 CAP officially becomes part of the U.S. Air Force's Total Force joining the regular, guard and reserve forces.


The Air Force Rescue Coordination Center (AFRCC) at Langley AFB (VA) coordinates all inland Search And Rescue (SAR) activities in the lower 48 states.

In most situations, the SAR operation is conducted by CAP.

CAP is averages 80 "saves" annually.



Cell Phone Forensics Team helped pinpoint both downed aircraft, which led to quick recovery efforts that likely saved the lives of the pilots and passengers in the face of harsh conditions.








- Membership is open to all: pilots and non-pilots
- CAP has a role for you based on your personal interests
- Cadet members are eligible to join CAP between 12 and 18 years of age
 - Cadets must terminate their cadet membership or become Senior members upon reaching their 22nd birthday
 - Students in the sixth grade at a school with a CAP program may join regardless of age upon entering the sixth grade
- Senior members must be 18 years of age or older (no upper limit)
 - Background check and training required to interact with cadets
 - Progress at your own pace no specific time commitment
- Members meeting Air Force grooming standards may wear the CAP USAF-style uniform
 - Members may also wear the authorized Corporate-style and civilian CAP uniforms
